

Dear Friends,

I hope the beginning of the New Year has been grace-filled and healthy for you and your loved ones. As the start of a New Year often brings resolutions to begin or renew commitments that can help us live a happier and holier life, it is also a good time to renew our habits and devotions in the parish. As we know, a Catholic church is not simply another building but it is a holy and consecrated place in which our Lord is truly present!

As we discussed last weekend at Mass, I'd like to briefly explain a small change concerning how we pastorally care for those of us who are unable to receive the Holy Eucharist. Persons who do not receive might include: Those who have not yet made their First Holy Communion, those who have not observed the one-hour eucharistic fast, those who are conscious of grave sin that they have not confessed, and those who are not Catholic.

It has been a practice at St. Christopher's for the priest or deacon to confer blessings upon those in the Communion processional line who are unable to receive. **In a change to this practice at our parish going forward, we will not anymore confer blessings during this part of the Mass.**

Among the theological and liturgical reasons for this change are:

1. While the practice originated at some point in the 1980's in U.S. parishes, the liturgical laws of the Church have never recognized giving blessings during Communion.
2. Some Masses have an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion ('EM') assisting with distributing Communion. Since an EM is a lay person, he or she is not permitted to give blessings during Mass. This means that whoever is in the processional line for an EM does not get a blessing while others in the line for a priest do so.
3. With an increase of young children at Mass (thank God!), the rapid succession of giving blessings distracts the minister from focusing on the central focus of this part of the Mass, which is reverently distributing the Holy Eucharist.
4. **The blessing for all people occurs at the end of Mass. Through the action of the priest or bishop, everybody in attendance receives the divine blessing from Almighty God. This is also a reminder of the importance of staying for the entirety of the Mass!**

With this change in place at our parish, I invite those who cannot receive to consider two options during Communion time:

1. Remain in your pew to pray silently or join in singing the Communion hymn.
2. Join in the Communion processional line and when you approach the minister, cross your arms and bow at the waist as a sign of reverence to Jesus who is present in the Eucharist before you. You can make a spiritual communion with Jesus by silently inviting Him into your heart. You could say: "Jesus, please enter into my heart" or "Jesus, please fill me with your love and mercy"

All who are present at the Holy Mass participate in the awesome mystery where heaven opens and God comes to sanctify, strengthen, and guide His people. As we gather as one people of faith and unite our praises and prayers together, each of us is then sent forth to be a vessel of His love and mercy in the world. May every grace be with you in the year ahead!



The Baptism

OF THE LORD

January 9, 2022

John said, "I am baptizing you with water,
 but one mightier than I is coming.
 I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals."

Luke 3:16

A MODEL FOR OUR PRAYER LIFE

The Advent/Christmas cycle that began on November 28 ends with the Baptism of the Lord. We likely have an image in our minds (based on details from the Gospels and works of art) of what that scene looked like. We might wonder, "Who else was there and who wasn't?" No disciples were present because Jesus had not yet begun his ministry. They would have to wait until the Transfiguration to hear a similar message. However, the three persons of the Blessed Trinity are accounted for: the Father (the voice from heaven), the Son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Interestingly, Luke alone notes that it was after Jesus had been baptized and while he was praying that the voice was heard. All of the Gospels show Jesus praying at turning points in his ministry; this is but the first example of Jesus' need to root himself in prayer throughout his life—a model for us to follow.

ON THE CUSP OF A NEW CREATION

It was on the Fourth Sunday of Advent this past December that we first heard of the two cousins, John and Jesus, meeting. Then it was in the womb of their mothers, Elizabeth and Mary. Now the cousins meet again on the shore of the Jordan River. John is already well known—so much so that people had begun to wonder if he was the long-awaited Messiah. Jesus, on the other hand, is about to begin his ministry. One could say that Jesus entered the waters of the Jordan as a private person and came out of them as a public one. The voice from heaven left no doubt about that. As we come to the end of the Christmas season our readings echo Isaiah and Titus (see Advent and Christmas Day readings) and together with today's Psalm 104 they point us to Pentecost. We are on the cusp of a new creation.

JOHN THE BAPTIST: PATRON SAINT OF LITURGICAL MINISTERS?

John the Baptist was what we might call today a "social influencer." People paid attention to what he had to say. And what he said affected the choices people made. Yet today's Gospel reminds us of John the Baptist's ultimate goal: "One mightier than I is coming." The Baptizer walks the fine line between drawing attention to himself with his fiery preaching and then re-directing that attention to Jesus, the "beloved Son." John the Baptist could be considered the "patron saint" of those who minister as lectors, extraordinary ministers of the eucharist, cantors, greeters, acolytes, and musicians. Isn't John's teaching a good goal for a liturgical (or any!) minister? Rooted in the graces of their own baptism, ministers must be skilled and confident enough to draw people's attention (or, at least, not turn them off!) and then gradually re-focus that attention on Jesus. It is a dynamic and awesome responsibility.

Saint Gregory Nazianzen

(c. 325 – c. 390)

After his baptism at 30, Gregory gladly accepted his friend Basil's invitation to join him in a newly founded monastery. The solitude was broken when Gregory's father, a bishop, needed help in his diocese and estate. It seems that Gregory was ordained a priest practically by force, and only reluctantly accepted the responsibility. He skillfully avoided a schism that threatened when his own father made compromises with Arianism. At 41, Gregory was chosen suffragan bishop of Caesarea and at once came into conflict with Valens, the emperor, who supported the Arians.

An unfortunate by-product of the battle was the cooling of the friendship of two saints. Basil, his archbishop, sent him to a miserable and unhealthy town on the border of unjustly created divisions in his diocese. Basil reproached Gregory for not going to his See.

When protection for Arianism ended with the death of Valens, Gregory was called to rebuild the faith in the great see of Constantinople, which had been under Arian teachers for three decades. Retiring and sensitive, he dreaded being drawn into the whirlpool of corruption and violence. He first stayed at a friend's home, which became the only orthodox church in the city. In such surroundings, he began giving the great sermons on the Trinity for which he is famous. In time, Gregory did rebuild the faith in the city, but at the cost of great suffering, slander, insults, and even personal violence. An interloper even tried to take over his bishopric.

His last days were spent in solitude and austerity. He wrote religious poetry, some of it autobiographical, of great depth and beauty. He was acclaimed simply as "the Theologian." St. Gregory Nazianzen shares the celebration of his liturgical feast with St. Basil the Great on January 2.

Reflection

It may be small comfort, but post-Vatican II turmoil in the Church is a mild storm compared to the devastation caused by the Arian heresy, a trauma the Church has never forgotten. Christ did not promise the kind of peace we would love to have—no problems, no opposition, no pain. In one way or another, holiness is always the way of the cross.

Family Connection to this Week's Gospel

Gospel Reading: Luke 3:15-16,21-22

Jesus is baptized by John.

Every family has a unique identity that is defined by the behaviors, attitudes, and expectations that govern a family's daily life. This identity is influenced by the family history of the parents, but each family's expression of this history is unique. In today's Gospel, we learn that Jesus' behavior, attitudes, and expectations were governed by his identity as God's beloved Son. In our Baptism, we were made children of this same heavenly Father. This identity as members of the family of God, and as brothers and sisters of Jesus, also shapes our family's daily life.

As you gather as a family, identify some of the expectations and behaviors that govern your family life by answering the question, "What are some of the things that make our family life unique?" Celebrate these things about your family life. Read today's Gospel, Luke 3:15-16,21-22. Observe that Jesus' identity as the Beloved Son of the Father governed his behaviors, attitudes, and expectations. Recall that at our Baptism we were made children of this same heavenly Father. How does this identity as a member of the family of God govern and shape our family life? Conclude in prayer together that we will remain faithful to our baptismal identity as children of God and as brothers or sisters of Jesus. Conclude by praying together the Lord's Prayer.

About Our Faith: Why is St. Peter's Square shaped like an oval?

If you look at a picture of St. Peter's Square, you may notice that it isn't square at all, but rather an open-ended oval. Two semi-circular rows of colonnades sweep out from each side of St. Peter's Basilica and curve toward one another, as though they were "embracing" the square.

And that is exactly what the architect, Gian Lorenzo Bernini, intended. The colonnades represent the "maternal arms of Mother Church," as he himself put it. She embraces all souls, all people, all nations into her fold.

The piazza is shaped as an oval, representing the cosmos and illustrating how God's providence orders all of creation. An ancient Egyptian obelisk, once built for a pagan god but now rededicated to Christ the King, stands at the piazza's center and becomes the focal point of a giant sundial as it casts its shadow across the square throughout the day.

A granite meridian indicates where the obelisk's shadow will fall at noon. White discs running from the obelisk along the meridian in a northerly direction mark out where the tip of the shadow will fall at various points in the year. We can therefore see the cosmos—the sun, the seasons, the stars, the movement of the universe—ordered and sanctified by God's power and providence.


